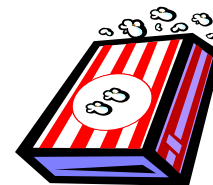

An Easter Message From Bishop Pederson

Last fall, after the leaves had abandoned the trees, when the clouds looked dipped in a dreary gray, and the temperature was nearly cold enough to make a tongue on a pump handle unwise, we planted tulip bulbs at our house. That's not an unusual activity, unless you do it with a four-year-old.

Mya eagerly joined me in digging small holes in the soft dirt. Occasionally, a worm was discovered and the root of a weed pulled. Out of a bag filled with brown, tear-shaped orbs, she fetched one bulb after another and poked them into the holes. Apparently, the tips of the bulbs are to be pointed upward, but who knows which direction Mya pressed them into the ground? Finally, Mya lightly packed moist earth over the entire flower bed so that the bulbs would rest in their earthen tombs for the long winter to come.

As granddaughter and old man (yes, me) worked, we talked. Mya knew nothing about flower bulbs, and she could not conceive of how "those round things" we put in the ground were going to sprout into tulips. Nor could Mya conceive of the length of time that would pass before the bulbs would grow. Next spring might as well have been light years in the future.

We've now experienced that long winter, and we and all of creation await the warmth that will awaken the earth. Mya has long forgotten the planted bulbs, even though I occasionally speak of them and point to the edge of the driveway where a five-foot snow bank covers her gardening effort. Buried and gone and forgotten.

A grace moment will take place this spring. When Mya sees the tulips push their way up from their wintery graves to embrace the spring air and burst forth in color, we will not only talk about bulbs and tulips, we will also talk about Easter, about death and life, about Jesus, love, and hope. It will be time for resurrection talk.

Mya is now five, and I have no doubt that she will grasp the mystery and wonder of life rising from the earth in ways adults cannot. Seeds of faith will be planted within her that I trust the Spirit will cause to flourish. Mya will know of the Risen Christ, the one who loves her enough to be placed in an earthen tomb and raised to new life so that she might know a holy love. That, too, is my Easter prayer for you.

Love is come again like wheat that springs up green."

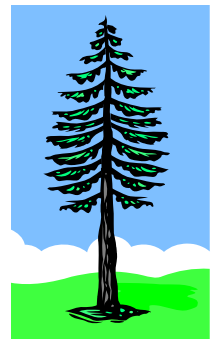

May is SKIN CANCER AWARENESS MONTH!

Did you know that skin cancer is the most common form of cancer, accounting for about half of all reported cancers? Everyone needs to protect themselves from the sun and should be familiar with their own skin, especially the pattern of moles, freckles and beauty marks. It also helps to have someone else check the skin on your back. Be alert to changes in the number, size, shape or color of spots on the skin, and call your doctor if any unusual changes are found.

TYPES OF SKIN CANCERS

Because different types of skin cancers behave differently, they are divided into two major groups: nonmelanoma and melanoma.

Nonmelanoma skin cancers (usually basal cell and squamous cell cancers) are the most common cancers of the skin. About 75% of skin cancers are **basal cell carcinoma**, which begins in the lower layer of the epidermis. They usually begin on areas exposed to the sun such as the head and neck. Basal cell cancers tend to grow slowly, and it is very unusual for a basal cell cancer to spread to distant parts of the body. But, if it is not treated, it can grow into nearby areas and invade the bone or other tissues beneath the skin. 35-50% of people who have one basal cell cancer will develop another within 5 years. **Squamous cell carcinoma** which begins in the upper part of the top layer of skin, the epidermis, accounts for about 20% of all skin cancers, on the face, ears, neck, lips, or back of your hands; squamous cell cancers are more likely to invade deeper fatty tissues below the skin, and more likely to spread to lymph nodes or other distant body parts.

Melanoma accounts for about 3% of all skin cancers, but it causes most skin cancer-related deaths. Melanoma is cancer that begins in the melanocyte cells, which may keep producing melanin coloring so that melanoma tumors are often (not always!) brown or black. Melanoma most often appears on the trunk of fair skinned men and on the lower legs of fair-skinned women, but it can appear other places as well. While melanoma is almost always curable in its early stages, it is more likely than other skin cancers to spread to other parts of the body...less common but more deadly.

RISK FACTORS

- having a skin cancer in the past
- too much exposure to ultraviolet light (sunlight, tanning lamps, tanning booths, etc.)
- fair skin
- men (twice as likely as women to have basal cell cancer, three times as likely to have squamous cell cancer)
- chemicals (exposure to large amounts of arsenic, industrial tar, coal, paraffin, certain types of oil)
- radiation (especially in kids undergoing cancer therapy)
- certain long-term or severe skin problems including psoriasis or xeroderma pigmentosum
- weak immune system (e.g. organ transplant patient)
- viral infections (small number of non-melanoma cancers linked to human papillomavirus [HPV])
- smoking
- genetics



THE ABCD RULE...

How can you tell a normal mole or freckle from a cancerous one?

A: asymmetry: one half of the mole does not match the other half

B: border: the edges of the mole are irregular, notched

C: color: the mole is not the same color all over – maybe shades of tan, brown, black, sometimes patches of red, blue or white...

D: diameter: the mole is wider than about ¼ inch (though doctors can identify smaller melanoma cancers...)

PREVENTION....

- Limit time in the sun between 10 am and 4 pm
- Seek shade
- Slip on a shirt – long-sleeved, tightly woven fabric
- Slop on sunscreen with SPF 15 or higher
- Slap on a hat – wide brim to cover face, ears, neck
- Wear sunglasses with 99-100% UV ray absorption

COUNCIL MEETING

OUR SAVIOR'S LUTHERAN CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

March 8, 2011, 7 pm – Fireside Room

Devotions: A few members shared a faith story about themselves.

1. Call to order by President Amy Eitrheim at 7:05pm.

- a. Adoption of agenda-additions or corrections, and format changes. Motion accepted by Ken/Scott. Motion carried.
- b. Acceptance of minutes of 2/22/11 meeting by Mark/Lisa. Motion carried.

2. Staff and Committee Reports

A. Pastors Report (oral) – Pastor Hendrickson asked the council how we think things are going. All council members agreed things are moving forward. He discussed his typical schedule and working from home due to gas prices, which is supported by the council.

B. Finance Committee Report (written) – Current checking balance is \$12,717.90. As of 2/28/11 our disbursements exceeded receipts by \$2,267.39. No benevolence payments have been made year to date. Discussion at the Finance Committee is looking into paying the benevolence responsibilities on a quarterly basis. Arvin Solsaa provided a detailed print out of the 2010 financial data and 2011 budget data. The Finance Committee is looking for additional members, please contact Mark Kalscheur if interested.

The Stewardship Committee is going to be rolled up into the Finance Committee at the current time. The group has proposed a stewardship drive with the 1-2-3 Easy approach. Fill out the enclosed pledge card and return, Consider contributing 2% of gross household income, and Enroll in Simply Giving Program. Finance/Stewardship Committee will coordinate letter and pledge cards to be distributed within a month. Motion approved by Scott/Jenna. Motion carried.

C. Executive Committee Report (written) – Jenna Creaser will distribute the approved Executive Committee minutes to the council.

D. Other committee or member reports (oral):

- Personnel Committee – Update on those willing to serve on the committee.
- Youth Committee – Liddy Achter is still willing to serve. Barb is continuing to follow up with other possible members.

E. Motion accepted to approve all of the written and oral reports by Amy/Barb. Motion carried.

3. Old business ---“what we completed and what we are working on”

A. Offering pick-up duty signup sheet distributed for council members to sign up. Please make sure to take another person with each council member when putting the offering into the specific location.

B. Thank you note writing – Lisa Brogan offered to write the thank you notes for this month.

C. Council retreat, dates, agenda, and format - Troy will send out an email to retrieve available dates by council members to attend. Executive Council will determine the format and agenda.

D. Soup supper sign-up sheet – Council is scheduled to coordinate the soup and supper on March 23rd. A signup sheet was sent around to assist.

E. Healthy Congregations/Leading Congregations in Anxious Times - Pastor Hendrickson discussed another option to the Health Congregations through a book called Leading Congregations in Anxious Times. He will follow up with more details at the next meeting.

F. Report: Committee updates – Jenna Creaser submitted an electronic file of all the committees and which council member was asked to complete the committee template and contact each committee on progress. Many council members received feedback and updated the spreadsheet.

2. Consent agenda---Council members agree to the process, as Executive council will create the consent agenda and send a few days prior.

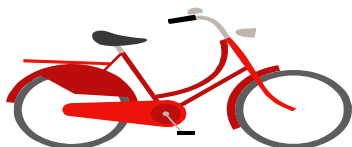

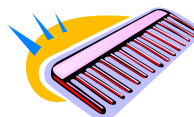

Although summer will be a great time and there are many exciting things to do, it's a bit sad to know that preschool classes will be over until fall. A big thank-you goes out to all who have supported the preschool this past year—from your prayer support to donations; from financial help to wandering through the room to say hi to the children. Your support provides such a gift to the children and their families during their time at preschool.

We just had families come for the Easter celebrations and what a grand time!!! The families made projects with the children; made honey toast to eat for snack; and sang songs for the families.
